Some news from last term

Farewell and thank you to Principal Mary Garvey

It was with a heavy heart that we bade farewell to our wonderful Principal, Mrs Mary Garvey, in April of this year.

Mrs Garvey has been a pivotal figure in St. Colman's for 38 years and she will be sorely missed by all who were lucky enough to know her.

Mrs Garvey began as a substitute teacher in St. Colman's in 1981. She went on to have her teaching practice with us in 1982 and 1983 and then, on September 3rd 1984, Mrs Garvey joined the permanent staff of St. Colman's N.S.

The first class she taught was second class, but during her time as a teacher she has taught every class level and has spent time in Special Education. She has been instrumental in bringing many educational initiatives to the school which have enhanced every classroom.

In 2000, Mrs Garvey became Deputy Principal working alongside Mrs O'Sullivan. Mrs Garvey took this new role seriously and continued working to ensure that every classroom was equipped with all the necessary resources to help children of all abilities.

Mrs Garvey always had a keen interest in helping children with additional needs and it was during this time as Deputy Principal, that she stepped things up a gear by researching new approaches that would respond to the diversity of needs that are found in classrooms today.

When Mrs O'Sullivan retired in December 2010, everyone waited with bated breath to see who her successor would be. The news that it was Mrs Garvey was greeted with delight.

She took up the role in January 2011 and from that first day right up until this April, Mrs Garvey has worked tirelessly to



improve all aspects of school life for the students and their families, staff and the extended school community. At all times, Mrs Garvey endeavoured to make every child feel welcome and experience a sense of belonging.

She strived to remove any and all barriers to enable every student to achieve the maximum benefit from their schooling.

SNA Trish Murphy chatted with some of the students in last year's fourth class and asked them what comes to mind when they think of Mrs Garvey.

There was no shortage of replies... caring, helpful, choose time, Christmas fair, Communion parties, graduation night, stories and Gaelige over the intercom, dressing up as a witch on Halloween, bouncy castles, amazing school tours, good sense of humour, ice cream van, playground markings, 5K garden party and The Big Sing.

The replies just kept coming, which only goes to prove how much everyone loved Mrs Garvey.

A week of festivities in the school, including classroom visits, a garden party for parents and families and a fun day for all school pupils, ended with a Mass held in St Paul's Church on the Friday morning, officiated by Fr Phil Gaffney.

Students, staff, parents, past pupils, former staff and well wishers gathered to wish Mrs Garvey all the best, as she enters the next chapter of her life.

Many contributed to the celebration, all with kind words to say. Our school choir sang some very well chosen hymns and songs that were special to Mrs Garvey. As the Mass drew to a close, everyone sang a St. Colman's version of 'Walking on Sunshine'.

This fantastic fun-filled and sometimes emotional week culminated in a loud and cheerful send off, when all the children and staff gathered outside the school.

A guard of honour was created by the fifth and sixth classes and Mrs Garvey left in her newly decorated car to the cheers and applause of the crowd!

STUDENTS, staff, family and friends of St. Colman's joined forces to celebrate the All Ireland Fleadh Cheoil's homecoming to Mullingar this year.

The All Ireland Fleadh returned to Mullingar in August, in what was a welcome return to the place where Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann was founded in 1951, bringing half a million visitors to the town.

St. Colman's NS marked the event in June with a series of musical performances, presentations and a fundraiser.

Organisers Ms. Sinead Duffy and Ms. Bríd Clarke reeled in talented members of the wider school community for the events.

A traditional music concert was performed for every class in the school. Trad talent on show included Philip Clarke on piano accordion, Olive Kilbane on fiddle, Noel Battle on harmonica, Ms. Sinead Duffy on piano, Ms. Bríd Clarke on céilí drums and Ms. Aine Casey on fiddle. Their selection of reels, jigs and hornpipes showcased the best of trad music for each child from Junior Infants up to Sixth Class. Talented pupils who performed in this concert were Irish dancers, Amy from last year's fifth class, and Brooke and Ali from last year's second class, as well as Darragh McCabe from last year's fifth class who played guitar.

The following day was another showcase, with Joe Connaire chairperson of Westmeath Comhaltas and the Fleadh Executive Committee, and All Ireland Fleadh toppers, his daughter Ellen on tin whistle and Irish dancing, Aoife Dunleavy on banjo, Anna Dunleavy on guitar, and St. Colman's SNA June Shanley on sean nós dancing.

There was a display of Irish traditional musical instruments and Ms. Clarke organised a

quiz and presentation which was delivered throughout every classroom in the school.

A non-uniform day was organised with funds raised going to the Fleadh, and throughout the week, events had children and staff clapping their hands and tapping their feet.

"Hopefully we have inspired some children to take up Irish music and dancing", said Ms. Clarke and Ms. Duffy. "We hope it's the first of many."





Colman's boys take home Cumann na mBunscol trophy

A St. Colman's NS, Mullingar panel laden with talent was in spectacular form in the 2022 Division 2 hurling final at TEG Cusack Park, with a second half hat-trick from Manus Kelly and a superb displays from captains Jack Connaughton and Eoghan Beehan earning the school its first title in a decade.

Gallant St Michael's NS, Castletown Geoghegan, whose never-say-die spirit was epitomised by captain Billy Whelan and top scorer Daniel Masterson, were unfortunate to meet such a well-drilled and physically imposing side, who would have given Division 1 opposition a

run for their money.

St. Colman's led 2-10 to 0-1 at half-time, with goals from Eamonn Gannon and Eoghan Beehan complemented by points from Connaughton (0-4), Cian Matthews Tyrrell (0-2). Beehan, who had 1-3 in total in the first half, scored the pick of the goals, rifling the sliothar home on 17 minutes.

The Mullingar school introduced a raft of subs in the second half, but they seemed to be as strong as the starters. After play resumed, Connaughton found the net within seconds, but it was sub Manus Kelly who caught the eye with a scintillating hattrick. The best of these

goals came on 39 minutes, when he smashed to the net after an inch-perfect ball from Gannon.

Jack Devine (0-2), Matthews Tyrrell and Cillian Breslin also found their range for the winners, while for Castletown, captain Billy Whelan picked off two decent scores. But from midway through the first half, there was only going to be one winner here, and at full-time Westmeath Cumann na mBunscol chairman Derek Butler presented the trophy to St. Colman's joint captains Eoghan Beehan and Jack Connaughton.

Local Scientist visits 3rd class

On Wednesday 18 of May, Ms Skelly organised an interesting visit to the school by Dale Treadwell, who works with Midlands Science. He spent the day giving an interesting science talk to the then 3rd classes.

He started off by showing us some magnifying containers, each one holding different bugs – for example a millipede, a lady bug and a spring-bug. We also discussed the butterfly life cycle and watched a video about the importance of bees. Then we went outside to a tree beside the running track and Dale showed us how to find insects by shaking trees. We were lucky to find insects – mites and spiders.



Next he showed us a hazel and blackthorn sticks, which were used for storytelling and he also went through the book he wrote about 'Robby Robin is not in a Christmas Mood' which covers all the native Irish birds. The game we played outside was Marco Polo, which was so much fun, and also we built a dome out of big and small sticks that we had. Dale showed us how to build a dome and we had to work as a team. The Wallace's star was used to help build it. As a class, this was our favourite



part of the whole day. Finally, we watched a video inside the classroom while Dale was disassembling the Dome. The video was about prehistoric animals and plants, which was fascinating. My favourite animals in the video were all the different dinosaurs and there were many plants such as tree ferns, horse tails and Wallace's pine. Overall, the day was a total success! All classes really enjoyed their day.
